Margaret Saunders' Meanderings

It is not a very promising start to my walk today. Yesterday was sunny but this morning heavy rain is falling. However, I had made plans to walk with a friend to Elham, have lunch at the Cosy Tea Rooms and then walk back. By the time we finally set off towards midday, the rain has stopped although the sky remains leaden. The walk naturally falls into three parts: down to Yew Tree Cross and along the edge of the copse towards Ottinge, across the valley road and down to the Nailbourne; along the valley floor towards Elham and then up into Elham, past the parish church and into the main street.

Late April and new leaves are bursting forth on almost every tree and bush, some smooth and shapely such as hawthorn, others such as beech, crinkled and folded as they gradually unfurl. Paths are muddy, the grass is wet and drips hang from every surface. There is a



north-easterly breeze, fresh against our faces with no sign of further rain, but equally no sign of sunshine either, although the sky is lightening. To our right rabbits are running riot in the paddock, little ones chasing each other



and older ones content to sit and eat. Evidence of their burrowing is everywhere and we take care not to twist or break an ankle in one of their excavations. Gnarled elder trunks to the left look dead but newly sprouting leaves give the lie to this. Nettles abound, their fresh green shoots, rich in nutrients, ideal for adding to compost heaps, tea and soups! Once through the gate at the bottom the Nailbourne is close to flooding the surrounding area as it does a right angle turn at speed, giving the optical illusion of running uphill. It is flowing with no sound today, too full to be tumbling over obstacles on its bed.

Fresh molehills litter the field and in one these, a lone daisy has managed to keep its head above the disturbed soil. Grazing sheep keep the grass growth in check and as yet few Spring flowers are visible except for the ubiquitous dandelion. Over the fence, a small

white feather floats down, gently rocking in the breeze. Branches of weeping willows with their fresh yellowgreen foliage hang and sway gracefully in the breeze like gentle waterfalls. This year's larch cones, soft and green are emerging amongst the little tufts of new needles, as Europe's only deciduous conifer begins another year of its life. Our ancestors thought that the wearing and burning of larch would offer protection against evil spirits.

Crossing over Shuttlesfield Lane the Elham Valley Way does a dog-leg before taking off along a hedge line with open fields to the east, which rise to the ridgeline above the valley. Forming the hedge are elder, hawthorn, wayfarer and blackthorn all intertwined with brambles and wild rose. No crop appears to be growing in the

field to the right – it is full of old self-seeded rape, groundsel, speedwell, both red and white deadnettle, all providing much needed forage for insects. Crossing over the lane leading up to Acrise the path continues, past a piece of old rusty farm machinery designed to stop vehicles entering the field. Running alongside is the Nailbourne, cloudy after the recent rain and running fast and full. Birdsong fills the air and as the wind is coming from the north-east, no sound from passing traffic reaches us, giving the illusion of a greater remoteness than is the reality. Occasional passing bumblebees add to the sounds of birdsong and a weathered elder tree has bent through time into a seahorse shape. Wheat is growing in the field next to the path, tall thin shoots pushing skywards. As the cloud base lifts and the sky begins to brighten, we turn left into the delicious sounding Lickpot Lane and head towards Elham village centre via The Square.

Having had lunch we are pleased to see the sun shining and with coats undone we set off again, this time southwards back towards Lyminge, alongside the stream and between houses. An ash tree, cut back drastically and looking lifeless, except for its characteristic black buds, stands like a natural sculpture, small black knobs



of King Alfred's cake fungus visible indicating a less than healthy tree. Celandines brighten the shady path and pale pink lady's-smock, or cuckooflowers, grow close to the water, loving the riverbank habitat the Nailbourne provides. Through the gate and back out into the open fields, the path follows the hedge line. After a while a lark's song fills the air and we search the sky for the creator of this uplifting sound. No sign of the singer until I see a lark rise from the field, which has not been ploughed or sown thus providing ideal nesting places, flying skywards higher and higher, its strong song becoming fainter as it soars. With this beautiful sound ringing in our ears, four swallows swoop across the path in front of us, flying fast from east to west, dipping and diving over grazing sheep, catching insects on the wing, their aerial elegance never failing to amaze. One swallow doesn't make a Summer, but surely four might well be an indication that Summer is not far away.

District Councillors' Update - June 2023

From: <u>Cllr Jenny Hollingsbee (Jenny.hollingsbee@folkestone-hythe.gov.uk</u> 07887918458) - your district councillor for North Downs West, Folkestone and Hythe District Council

Thank you for re-electing me as your District Councillor. I am grateful for the support of those who have voted for me and especially those who have helped with the campaign. North Downs West covers many villages and many houses are tucked away in the countryside which makes reaching every house a challenge but it's one I always think worth the effort. I would also like to thank my colleague Susan Carey for her support, friendship and help over the last 24 years which has covered many changes in parish boundaries. Susan did not



stand again for election to District Council but as she is our KCC Councillor we will continue to work together for the benefit of our residents.

Elaine Martin from the Green Party was the other candidate returned in our ward. Overall the results were Green 11, Labour 8, Labour & Co-operative 2, Conservative 5, Liberal Democrats 2, Independent 2. The Annual Meeting of the council is on 24 May at which a Leader will be elected and appointments made to committees. I wish the new council all the best in delivering our local services and balancing our finances at what is a challenging time for everyone in local government.

I am likely to continue to serve on the Planning Committee and be Leader of the Conservative Group. However you voted, you should feel free to contact me for help with District Council matters and I will continue to help. I have asked for Planning Application 23/0503/FH/CON Land Rear of Broad Street House Lyminge to be called in for consideration by the Planning & Licensing Committee and this has been noted by the Case Officer.

I'm sure you'll be as pleased as I was to learn that enforcement action by district councils was up and fly-tipping was down across Kent in 2020/21. The figures are in the annual report of the Kent Resource Partnership. As well as the fly-tipping information, the report includes data on the amount of waste collected, how much is recycled and where it goes to. You'll find it here: www.kent.gov.uk/_data/assets/pdf_file/0006/130596/Kent-resource-partnership-annual-report-2020-21.pdf

A recent example of enforcement action in our district was against Lee Nelson from Folkestone who sold waste disposal services on Facebook and then fly-tipped the rubbish. The fly-tipping was found on 15 March and Nelson was quickly identified as being responsible. He pleaded guilty in court on 12 April and his penalty was £950. (Anyone using a private contractor should check they hold a trade waste license and ask to be given a trade waste notice for the waste collected or they too could find themselves fined.) The District Council offers a bulky waste collection service from just £35 (Lee Nelson charged £90!) or you can take the waste to a Household Waste Recycling Centre yourself at no charge.

It was heart-warming to see so many people come together to celebrate the coronation of King Charles. Let's hope this joyful occasion will set the tone for the rest of his reign.

Pent Farm Update – RNA Energy's ambition to bring solar to Postling, Hythe

In December 2022, RNA Energy ran a consultation on its plans to bring a new solar facility to Postling to help tackle climate change and keep energy costs down. We are delighted to announce that following the feedback received during the consultation, the final plans have now been submitted to Folkestone & Hythe District Council for consideration.

The solar facility will cover 22ha of land and export up to 18MW of electricity, generating enough energy to power around 3,800 homes. The site is adjacent to Stanford substation, making it an excellent location to supply the national grid with our clean, renewable energy.

RNA Energy would like to thank readers and the wider community for taking the time to share their feedback on the initial plans. In total, we received 57 individual submissions which have been instrumental in helping us shape the final application. We were also delighted with the overwhelming amount of support we received, with 95% of feedback form respondents agreeing that there is a need to generate more of our energy from renewable sources.

A key consideration for RNA Energy when developing the plans, was to boost biodiversity and ensure habitats for local wildlife are protected and enhanced. We were thrilled to read that respondents agreed with our ambition to deliver 4ha of habitat protection, as well as measures to create new ponds, woodland wet and woodland reed beds, and meadow areas to establish robust habitat corridors to help local wildlife flourish on site and across the wider landscape. We believe these measures will have a significant impact on increasing the numbers of birds, barn owls, brown hares, common toads, bats and small mammals within the area.

We are grateful that respondents shared our ambition to deliver cheaper energy in the UK, with 93% of feedback from respondents agreeing there is a pressing need to generate cheaper electricity to help tackle the cost-ofliving crisis. Solar energy is the cheapest form of electricity generation in history and our proposals for Pent Farm will help bring down energy prices at a time when consumer costs are soaring. As the plans have been submitted, we are now calling on those who believe in the urgent need to generate clean renewable energy and protect our environment for future generations to let Folkestone & Hythe District Council know.

RARE BUMBLEBEE SPOTTED IN LYMINGE

A rare, all-black bumblebee was spotted on Court Lodge green on 3rd May, foraging on the abundant flowers of white dead-nettles that have grown up on the bank close to the ponds at the bottom of the green.

This is the first time that this particulaar bumblebee species (The Ruderal Bumblebee "*Bombus ruderatus*") has been reported from Lyminge Parish, and brings the total number of bumblebee species found in the parish to 11 (of which three are "Cuckoo" bees).

It is one of the UK's largest bumblebees and the only one to regularly produce all-black individuals. Banded individuals are very similar to the common Garden Bumblebee, hence the alternative English name of the Large Garden Bumblebee.

The Ruderal Bumblebee declined greatly in the UK during the 20th Century but has benefitted, in recent years, from various schemes to encourage clover-rich arable margins and meadows. Overwintered queens are known to forage on the white dead-nettle. The species may have benefitted locally from our efforts to increase wild-flower diversity on our community green spaces. This beautiful pollinator is a welcome sight in the parish, and we hope to see plenty more. (Pictured below)

To Dig or Not to Dig??

Over my many gardening years there has always been some controversy over the way the ground is prepared prior to planting. Double dig, single dig or now, no-dig!! What is it to be??

More recently, my allotment neighbours have been opting for no-dig as this, I am reliably informed, helps to reduce the carbon dioxide being released into the atmosphere and help to reduce global warming. So I'm in the process of giving it a go. This is no double-blind trial with a placebo, but I do know both vegetables gave good yields last year having dug the soil.



This year the ground was prepared in the autumn/winter by spreading a couple of inches of manure/waste compost on the surface and left for Mother Nature to incorporate it into the soil. Many of the dormant weed seeds are inhibited by this practice, but not all, as I found. Buttercup and bindweed remain undeterred by the lack of light and remain vigorously committed to growing.

Following the dry weather last summer, I decided to dedicate the majority of the allotment to broad beans and potatoes. In early spring, I planted rows of beans, quite simply by using a dibber into the soil and popping a bean into each hole.

With regard to the potatoes (Charlotte variety), I chose to create a hole in the compact ground for each chitted potato using an auger attached to my drill. This made the process of planting the chitted potatoes considerably easier.

At the time of writing this article, I can confirm that the broad beans have shown a very healthy response and are now in the process of flowering. As far as the potatoes are concerned, they have started to push through the soil which I am starting to earth up. This has proven to be a more difficult task since the ground is consolidated around them. However, with a spade and a little bit of elbow grease the soil was loosened and placed over the new growth.

So it remains to be seen how well these two vegetables crop later in the season and I will keep you up-to-date with their progress.

New Gardener's Workshops: February-April 2023



We greatly enjoyed hosting another group of new gardeners on this year's workshop series. As always, Anne and Geoff were wonderful hosts, sharing their garden and expertise with the group, mixing some group discussion with practical hands-on activities. One of this year's delegates was kind enough to share their reflections from the workshops:

'I recently attended the wonderful workshops that were offered by Thoughtful Food in Lyminge.

Our novice questions were answered with the passion they very obviously take in sustainable gardening and their love of it. And it was infectious! I couldn't wait to come home and try out all I'd learnt.

I had had a little go at growing last year but not from seeds. I'm over the moon at what I have learnt and achieved by attending these free workshops. The use of any materials we had was encouraged as opposed to buying all new and expensive from a garden centre. Hence my beans growing along with bamboo canes from my neighbours cuttings and my potatoes growing in a cage I found in a skip (with permission of course).

Reduce, reuse, recycling at it best which I really liked the emphasis on.

I've learnt a lot and with some fantastic people. Emma - thanks for the lovely cake always provided! Jackie - thanks for your advice and time and Anne - can't thank you enough for your teaching, showing us your lovely gardens and especially for the worm wee!'

We hope to be able to offer these again next year. So do look out for dates in the autumn when we open for bookings.

Testing your blood type at home

This call comes as NHS Blood and Transplant launches the second phase of its first ever mass home blood type testing campaign to help identify 5,000 individuals with the critical O negative blood. O negative blood is the universal blood type that can be given to any patient in an emergency or where their blood type isn't known.

The campaign is part of a trial by the NHS to use home test kits on a large-scale to identify people with a certain blood type and book them on to priority appointments and is one way in which new donors can fast-track to book their first appointment if they have this blood type. This is part of an ongoing focus by the NHS to collect enough of the right blood types, instead of collecting as much blood as possible.

Over the next six weeks 36,000 home testing kits will be sent to people who have recently registered but have not yet made an appointment. Those found to have O negative blood will be offered priority appointments.

If needed, the search will widen out and kits will be posted to up to 100,000 people registered with Give Blood over the coming months, until enough people with O negative blood are identified and booked on to donate. People who register but don't book an appointment are contacted by phone and email with opportunities to donate in their area to encourage them to make their first donation.

From the 29,000 kits sent out last autumn, 715 people who responded were O negative and two in five has either gone on to complete a donation or has an upcoming appointment to donate.

Last summer NHS Blood and Transplant announced a fiveyear strategy to recruit one million new donors of all blood types to ensure better matched blood for patients in the future and reduce health inequalities.

Blood is needed to help the NHS treat patients with cancer, blood disorders and those suffering medical trauma or undergoing surgery, and O negative blood is mostly used for emergency care. Each donation can save or improve up to three lives.

Out & About..

LYMINGE THEN AND NOW

Our monthly look at how Lyminge has changed over the years, with thanks to Lyminge Historical Society.



This is an example of a view that has changed radically in quite a short timeframe. Long-term residents may recognise the picture on the left, taken in 1977, eight years before the petrol station was demolished to make way for Wentworth Close, seen on the right. In those days, driving along the Elham Valley, you had a choice of where to fill up, with Elham and Barham both having petrol stations. The houses to the right of the picture, Mayfield Terrace, in Mayfield Road are still there, although what was Mayfield Stores ceased to be a shop some years ago. The façade of the now demolished Ethelburga Café is also just visible. Another sign of a bygone era is the notice on the petrol station advertising Quadruple Green Shield Stamps. Promotional trading stamps are now a thing of the past, but they were the direct ancestor of the consumer loyalty schemes that are still very much with us.
