

Margaret Saunders' Meanderings

Although it is just before 6am in mid June, the sun is already way up in the sky, an early mistiness beginning to clear. I am starting my walk today at Rhodes Minnis Chapel and am vaguely planning to do a circular walk on lanes new to me. The Chapel is bathed in this early sunshine, and opposite, the field has cylindrical bales dotted around haphazardly, just as they fell from the baling machine. Walking eastwards along Chapel Lane I breathe in the early morning scents of the countryside, damp and fresh. A wren flits out of the grass and into the hedge as I walk.

Birdsong, both near and far, keeps me company and a cow bellows in the distance. Otherwise silence. Hedgerows line the lane: hazel is the dominant plant for much of this stretch, with some hawthorn mixed in. Herb-robert,



fading cow parsley, stitchwort, white dead nettle, vetch, buttercups, bramble blossom, all are there, with dog roses having struggled up through the hedge to show their faces at the top. Gateways provide more extensive views across meadows teeming with grass and flowers or fields of well developed wheat – ears pale green and leaves a darker hue making for a mottled calm colour. One field I passed was full of barley mixed with wheat, which I have never seen before. Was this deliberate or a mistake I wonder? Leaning on the cold damp metal gate, I listen again to the deep



silence broken only by birdsong and I absorb the stillness. I look up and spot the quarter moon, well disguised in its chalky whiteness amongst high thin clouds, which remind me of sand patterns that are made by a retreating sea. Back to earth again where the ground is beginning to crack through lack of rain.

Recent hot days make the freshness of the air pleasing. Ahead I need to make a decision as to where I continue so I choose the Droveway as this will take me towards Lyminge Forest and eventually back to Rhodes Minnis. Another meadow is filled with pink tipped grasses, barely moving in the morning air. The Droveway would have been the route along which farmers drove their animals to market, the nearest being in Elham, where they would have been penned in Pound Lane prior to being sold. The Droveway undulates, the

animals probably rushing along the down stretches and then labouring up the inclines. It would have meant a very early start in order to reach the market in time for the sales.

Hedgerows continue to feature although at one point, fences suffice which open up the view on alternate sides. Along one such fence line, hedge cutters have missed two young lone oaks that are now growing in strength, presumably starting from stray acorns that a bird might have dropped. Turning the corner I descend into deep shadow and passing a huge oak, I wonder if this is the parent of the two adolescents a hundred or so yards back. Three coniferous



trees form a part-hedge into a drive, reminding me of the brushes in a car wash. I can smell the pine trees as I skirt the forest edge – the trees standing tall and straight, dwarfing the smaller deciduous trees in between. Purple foxgloves push

skywards, mimicking the pines but miniature in comparison. Birdsong echoes through the silence of the trees. Footpaths lead into the forest but as I do not know where they will lead, I decide to leave their exploration for another day, when that can be the sole purpose of my outing. A pretty and well-stocked garden to my right catches my eye and I admire its colour and



variety. Leaning out of the forest edge is a copper beech, the deep colour offering a bold contrast to all the varied greens.

Having not travelled on these lanes before, I now turn left onto the Stelling Minnis road and am glad to be on familiar territory. The early No 18 bus passes me, only the second vehicle I have seen since leaving home. To my right is another field of ramrod straight wheat, but sadly no field margin for wildlife to flourish. The edges that border the road have



wheat, but sadly no field margin for wildlife to flourish. The edges that border the road have been treated with weedkiller and have turned burnt yellow. And now amidst open fields the skylark sings strong and lyrical. More oaks have missed the hedge cutting and have grown mature. A sprinkling of scarlet poppies decorate the corner of the wheat field bringing colour to an otherwise uniform green. Bearing left the road enters the forest towards Park Wood and I see insects dancing in the last of the sunlight before the trees block it out. The strong perfume of the pines once again fills my nostrils. Fluffy flowers fall silently from overhead trees, forming a soft brown edge to the road. Boughs of beech trees are laden with mast along the length of every branch and twig. Finally, Gate Lane to the left takes me past the pond, now completely hidden by yellow iris plants and along honeysuckle laden hedgerows towards Chapel Lane, where I will turn right back towards the Chapel.

It has been over two hours of sights, sounds and scents enhanced by the stillness of an early morning in June. The perfect start to a day.

District Councillors' Update - July 2023

On 24th May Folkestone & Hythe District Council had their AGM where the new Leader was elected and the Cabinet Members were appointed. Cllr Abena Akuffo-Kelly was elected as Council chair and Cllr Anita Jones was elected Vice Chair. Cllr Jim Martin was also voted in as the new Leader of the Council. The new Cabinet Members were appointed: Cllr Mike Blakemore for Community and Collaboration, Cllr Polly Blakemore for Transport, Regulatory Services and Building Control, Cllr Gary Fuller for Resident engagement and accountability, Cllr Rich Holgate for Place Plan, Heritage, Tourism and District Economy, Cllr Jim Martin for Otterpool Park and Planning Policy, Cllr Tim Prater for Finance



and Governance, Cllr Stephen Scoffham for Climate, Environment and Bio Diversity, Cllr Rebecca Shoob for Housing and Homelessness and Cllr Jeremy Speakman for Assets and Operations.

I am pleased to tell you that your District Council have recently announced their Community projects grant funding of £90,000. Each ward member has a budget of up to £3,000 to award to initiatives in their ward. Applications for 2023/24 are now being accepted. These grants can be vital to smaller, local organisations that have fewer opportunities to access grant funding from other sources so I would encourage eligible groups to contact me, and I can give you details of how to apply.

The last month has been a very busy time for me; attending several Parish Council meetings and attending the Councillor training sessions that Folkestone & Hythe District Council have provided. Unfortunately, I have not been able to attend all of the Parish Council meetings because of these essential Councillor training sessions.

I went to the Pentland Homes consultation in Etchinghill and have continued to meet many other residents in the ward.

Cllr Jim Martin, the new Leader, confirmed the current plans for Princes Parade have been cancelled, but has yet to say how the funding already spent will be dealt with – there was no announcement about replacing the existing Hythe Swimming Pool. I have been elected as Leader of the Conservative Group, I am a member of the Planning & Licensing and the Personnel Committees. At the recent 'Otterpool Gallop' including family runs, a 5K and a 10K run held at the Racecourse, I presented the medals and prizes to the winners. Although the North Downs is a large area to cover, he is keen to get out and meet residents and community groups as well as attend Parish Council Meetings, when he can and depending on his shifts. SAVE THE CHRISTMAS TREE AT MERIDEN WALK! The tree was in poor condition after a dry

SUNNINGDALE DEVELOPMENT, ETCHINGHILL

There was a meeting recently to outline the proposed development of the old nursery site between Teddars Leas Road and Canterbury Road.

The developer is proposing 30 houses of detached, semi-detached and affordable design. Access to the site would be via Teddars Leas Road during construction, but the proposed main access is off Canterbury Road half way along the hedge line between Teddars Leas and the Auto Economy garage.

As the proposal retains the majority of the hedging, residents viewing the proposals were very concerned about the safety of access to the development. Furthermore whilst a link to the existing footpath on Canterbury Road is evident, there is nothing to link the site with the Auto Economy Garage, meaning Etchinghill residents will still have to walk along a very dangerous section of road. When questioned if it were possible to put a roundabout opposite the Meridian Park access, which was felt to be a better solution, the developers said this was too expensive for a 30 house plan.

MATURE DRIVERS ROAD SAFETY PRESENTATION by Anna Allan

The presentation by KCC on 19th June at Etchinghill Village Hall was well attended with more than 30 villagers participating.

The main topics covered were:

- Give yourself space to be aware of your actions and the actions of others.
- Give yourself time to react in any given situation.
- Be aware of what is around you.
- Take regular breaks if on a long journey.
- Check your route beforehand to ensure you have the best driving plan in place.
- Don't drink and drive.

Did you know that 65% of accidents are caused by human error? The videos shown covered tailgating, smart motorway driving, various speed limits, driving at the correct distance (only a fool breaks the two second rule), age related subjects such as vision/health/ hearing/agility, eco-driving and driver fatigue.

If anyone requires help in having their vehicle fitted out to suit their needs, their doctor can organise an "Assessment of Driving", or you can book this yourself, through East Kent Drive Ability.



What to do in July

July is often hot and dry, so a lot of the time may be spent watering. With the weather, at time of writing, set to hopefully replenish our water supplies, we may be able to rely on the rain gods but if not keep watering plants to get them established and leave those already well established to fend for themselves. Watering the roots with a lot of water twice a week is better than sprinkling the plants every day. Try to water early in the morning – yes 6am is lovely at this time of year! You can reduce water loss and save time by mulching around your veggies with a layer of organic matter (straw or hay, grass clippings etc.) which will help keep the moisture in the soil. I am using wood chips this year but remember, NEVER mulch on a dry soil!

Don't forget that you can keep sowing throughout the summer months, not only to create a successional harvest of vegetables (e.g. French beans for a late crop in September) but also to start growing your winter veg that will supply you with valuable crops throughout the colder months and into spring.

Sow kohlrabi, lettuce, chard, chicory, Florence fennel, coriander. At the end of the month start sowing your oriental greens like pak choi, salad rocket, mizuna, purple frills etc. and turnips. Now is a good time to sow spring cabbage (e.g. greyhound) as well. If they haven't gone out already it is time now to plant out your leeks. Dib holes about 15cm deep and place the leeks inside. Give them a good water and leave the weather to fill up the hole with time.

Most tomatoes have been late getting going but on cordon varieties don't forget to pinch out the side shoots and either add them to the compost heap or pot up for more tomato plants! Feed your plants with nitrogen rich feed – worm tea, comfrey tea, nettle tea or banana tea – obviously all diluted 10/1 weekly.

Your cordon tomatoes may not be ready for this but if they are...don't forget to stop them by removing the main shoot. Look for the leaf that's above the fourth truss (set of developing fruit) and cut it off here. This should ensure that all the fruits ripen by the end of the season. Bush tomatoes can be left to their own devices. Remember they will only give one crop so keep feeding. Climbing beans may also need stopping, to maximise cropping on existing side-shoots. Stop them when they reach the top of their support canes.

Beans need sufficient watering to help the seed pods set.

Keep on top of your weeds, it is so much easier to get rid of them as small seedlings. Hoeing also helps to keep the moisture in the soil as it breaks up the top of the soil and stops the water from being drawn up by capillary action through evaporation

If you haven't netted your brassicas, it may be worth picking off the caterpillars of the cabbage white butterflies that are munching away on your leafy vegetables before they have eaten them all.

And don't forget to enjoy your garden in all its beauty!

Rhubarb And Ginger Jam

Prep four 240ml jars. Wash well and pop in the oven at 140°C for at least 10 minutes.

Clean 1kg of rhubarb and cut into 1cm long pieces. Sweat till a bit watery. Add 3tblsp lemon and 1/2 of lemon rind and a cored grated/finely chopped apple. Add 50grm finely grated root ginger. Dissolve in 750grm granulated sugar. Gently simmer till reduced and set, demonstrated by dropping a little onto a refrigerated plate. Cover and cool for 20mins stir a couple of times. Ensure jars are dry and hot. Pour and seal. Label and date.



In light of both the climate and cost of living crises, community food resilience is more important than ever. If you have excess produce from your garden over the next few months, and you're not sure you can use it yourself please consider these options.

It is great to share excess especially in glut times with friends, neighbours and family.

If you have a safe spot with good footfall, pop it outside your house with a note explaining it's free to be taken.

The community allotment was visited by representatives of FareShare recently, an organisation based in Ashford that acts as a go between, co-ordinating food suppliers like Supermarkets with food banks and community pantries across Kent. They are struggling to find supplies of fresh food. A seed (forgive the pun!) was sown, if all of us growers could be encouraged to grow a little more than we need......

We are Bee Connected! -Aydan Khan, Bumblebee Conservation Trust

We are Bee Connected, a Bumblebee Conservation Trust project based in South Kent. Over the past 15 years, our focus has been on conserving rare and common bumblebees through habitat conservation work. Our landscape-scale project involves restoring lost wildflower meadows, monitoring bumblebee populations through bee walks and blitzes, and engaging local communities through ID

sessions and walks/talks. We have recently expanded into the Folkestone/ Pent Downs area, aiming to improve monitoring records, recruit volunteers, conduct bee walks and surveys, and enhance pollinator habitats.

Kent is the best region in the UK for rare bumblebee species, hosting 5 out of the 7 rarest species, making it an exciting location for bee walks. We will be in Lyminge on August 2nd to conduct a Bumblebee Walk & Talk, providing information on our bumblebee species, offering a taste of a bee walk survey, and sharing community updates and opportunities to get involved. Following this, we will organise a Bumblebee Identification session next spring covering bumblebee ecology and key





identification characteristics, reasons for declines and what we can all do to help.

If you're interested in volunteering with the Bumblebee Conservation Trust, you can join our Bumblebee Blitz days held twice a month in Dungeness, Folkestone, and Rye; upcoming dates are 5th and 21st July, 8th and 24th August, 8th and 20th September, and 7th and 19th October. From Kent Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) Matthew Scott

Rural crime has always been a priority for me. Crime is important no matter where it takes place and this has always been a guiding principle of my Police and Crime Plan. I therefore wanted to update you on rural matters that have been raised with me in recent months that Kent Police and I have acted upon. First, I'm pleased to report that the Chief Constable has added Rural Crime to the Control Strategy. The control strategy is the document that sets out the operational priorities for crime prevention, intelligence and enforcement.

It provides the force with a framework to ensure officers and staff focus on the crime types and offenders causing most harm within our communities and presenting most risk to law-abiding residents. This was a key ask of the NFU and I'm pleased this has been listened to.

Secondly, the Neighbourhood Policing Model has started its transition this week. This means that every ward will have a named Officer, and as the Chief Constable has said at my Performance and Delivery Board this week, this will effectively mean having rural beat Officers. These changes are already being seen across the county as the phased roll out of beat Officers begins. On top of this seven PCSOs will be added to the specialist Rural Crime Taskforce.

I have worked with MPs to lobby for greater penalties for flytipping. The Government has listened and will be bringing forward plans on this issue to put these in place. Additionally, the Government is consulting on legislation relating to equipment theft and prevention, so it would be great to see submissions from Kent. 



Out & About..

LYMINGE THEN AND NOW

Our monthly look at how Lyminge has changed over the years, with thanks to Lyminge Historical Society.



The view on the left of Station Road in 1910 shows it very much busier than the comparable view taken 112 years later from the garden of no 47. The livestock market drew in sheep from the surrounding farms. At that time, sheep farming was central to the life of the village and surrounding area. Sheep were grazing Tayne Field for another 50 years after this photograph was taken, showing how much Lyminge was a farming village until very recently. From the market, sheep could be loaded directly on to stock wagons at the adjacent railway halt, a special stop that was used solely for picking up livestock sold at the market. The line of the railway is still visible in the cutting behind the back gardens of the houses in Greenbanks. The houses visible in both pictures were built as a direct result of the opening of the railway in 1885, since it made it practical for the first time to live in Lyminge and commute to work daily in either Folkestone or Canterbury.



Lyminge Scouts at the Kent Scouts "Best Air Camp Ever"

Eighteen scouts, and four leaders from the Lyminge Scout Group enjoyed the "Best Air Camp Ever" organised by Kent Scouts over the first weekend in June near Paddock Wood. A total of 105 scouts joined the camp, from seven groups (1st Lyminge, 1st Herne Bay, 1st Whitstable, 5th Dartford, 14th Royal Tunbridge Wells, 17th Tonbridge and 20th Gillingham). Activities included archery, shooting, power kiting, rocket-making and, of course, flying. Every scout was treated to a 5 to 10 minute flight, mostly in micro-lights but a few fixed-wings also participated during the course of the weekend. A great time was had by all, despite the heat, the hay fever, and the mosquitoes (the biting variety)!

Thanks to everyone at Kent Scouts who organised this weekend, and to the pilots who made all those 100+ flights in the space of a day and a half!



Bloomin' Wonderful results from No-Mow May and our Wild Acre

It's been wonderful to see wild areas popping up around the village and people have been sharing with us the wildflowers spotted in June where we have left areas unmown. I loved seeing the vibrant cluster of poppies at the bottom of Silverlands and lots of people have shared orchid photos with us. Up here on the North Downs we have precious chalk grassland habitats that are home to some of Kent's most iconic orchids. As well as being





a highlight of popular nature reserves like Kent Wildlife Trust's Park Gate Down (between Elham and Stelling Minnis), they are being spotted in our gardens and in the fields around the village popular with dog walkers. This just goes to show how valuable your garden can be as a habitat for wildlife! Orchids are a hugely diverse group of flowering plants worldwide (approximately 28,000 species) and within this group are some of the most striking of our UK wildflowers. We are really lucky to be able to find almost half of the fifty or so UK species in Kent. Different species flower in specific months and last a short time, most are over before the heat of summer but a few flower late in the year such as autumn lady's tresses. Many species have very complex life cycles and rely on specific insects for pollination. For example, the fly orchid flowers resemble females of a particular solitary wasp, the males of which are fooled into mating with them and pollen is transferred.

Here are some the ones spotted in Lyminge throughout June and ones to look out for in the coming months: In June we have seen lots Common Spotted Orchids (*Dactylorhiza fuchsii*). These are the ones you are most likely to find in your garden and flower between May and June. They can be identified by their spotted leaves (see photo). Their flowering spikes can be very variable from almost white through to pale pink and purple. After leaving our front garden in Barton Field uncut from April to July we now

have about 20-30 flowering 'spikes' emerge each year. The Bee Orchid (*Ophrys apifera*) generally flowers around the same time. This lovely example was from Dog Kennel Lane. It has a very striking flower that mimics a bumblebee. At the time of writing in late June we are starting to see Pyramidal Orchids (*Anacamptis pyramidalis*) appear. These tend to have a much bolder dark pink-cerise colour than the common spotted orchids.

All these species can be found in the fields around our village and gardeners may be lucky enough to find them appear in their wild acre contributions! Please share any photos of your wild acre with us at kakellett78@gmail.com
