Margaret Saunders' Meanderings

I have recently been with a small group of secular Franciscans on a pilgrimage to Assisi, so my next two meanderings will be from Italy.

Assisi is a city of steps. Set on a hilltop in Umbria overlooking a valley which stretches from Perugia to Spoleto, its medieval streets are steep and narrow, each level connected by flights of wide shallow steps which wind and twist their way up and down, revealing hidden treasures: miniature frescos depicting scenes from the life of St Francis; pots full of vibrant coloured plants; door knockers in the shapes of lions or faces; water fountains with weather-worn animal heads spouting out water; medieval style lanterns high up; old letterboxes set into walls; heavy wooden doors, reinforced with iron studs; arched 'bridges' joining two buildings above the street. Metre long iron wall ties help support and strengthen the walls of houses, all built in the local pink coloured stone – this is an earthquake zone and in 1997 two earthquakes hit the region around Assisi, one of 5.7 and the other 6.0 on the Richter scale, killing ten people and damaging and destroying many of the buildings, including the famous Basilica of St Francis where unique ceiling paintings by Giotto and Cimabue were destroyed.





Named a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Assisi is also known as the City of Peace. Despite the large number of tourists that visit, the town remains quiet, clean and safe. Due to the narrowness of the medieval streets, a one-way system operates and pedestrians have to press against the walls of the buildings to make room when a car passes.

The nights are quiet and peaceful, and the dawns are heralded by birdsong followed by chimes from the many churches that abound, the timbre so different from our own church bells. As I look out of my window in the early morning, mist lies along the valley pierced by tall dark green Cypress trees with the mountains forming a backdrop on the opposite side. In the time of St Francis, in the early 13th century, this valley was a mosquito ridden swamp but now it is fertile land divided into rectangular fields, so unlike our own with their meandering hedge-lines.

It is Sunday morning and the sound of bells fills the air as we walk down to the church of San Damiano, where we will attend morning mass. We walk past the Fontana del Tre Leoni, through the town where shops and cafés are beginning to open, and along the Via Borgo Aretino where shops border one side, the other giving an open view across the valley. On Saturdays, this street is full of market stalls where the townsfolk shop for food, carrying away bags of interesting looking vegetables. Palm tree leaves, fanning out from their stems,

quiver and rustle in the morning breeze and bees move from flower to flower. Once through the archway of the Porto Nuovo, which forms the eastern entrance into the walled city, we bear right down a flight of steps and onto the paved pathway, the Via San Damiano, which leads to the church. Olive groves lie either side with their old gnarled and twisted trunks and silver-grey leaves. Tall grass grows in between them, full of wild flowers. Settled into this grass is a cat, sleepy in the already warm sun. Birdsong fills the air: blackbird, redwing, nuthatch

and the fluted trilling of a blackcap. Cypress trees forge skywards on their straight trunks, the dark green foliage forming their distinctive shape so redolent of Mediterranean countries. A group of young nuns overtakes us as we pause to soak in our surroundings.

Simple and beautiful, the new chapel with whitewashed walls and honey coloured wooden flooring and seating, is gradually filling up. Clear windows look out onto a garden one side and





across the valley towards the mountains on another. This chapel is in stark contrast to the many other churches in the town, which are darker and more ornate. Out of the windows behind the altar I can see swifts swooping and swerving as they search for insects. It does not seem to matter that I cannot understand the majority of the language of the service – I can pick out a few key words and I manage to join in with the hymns. On our return walk someone spots a lizard running across the path. Six inches long and

with bright green spots along its back, it darts, stops, then darts again, finally

disappearing into the grass. Passing a stone-built house further along, another similar lizard zig zags down the stone wall of a house, then hides behind a large pot of pink petunias. We pause and sit on some benches, the heat of the day beginning to build up, and decide to stop at a café in the Piazza Santa Chiara with the beautiful church of the same name forming one side of the square, built in stripes of pastel pink and cream stone with its tall square bell tower set to one side. To the right of the main door, a huge forlorn looking stone lion lies with his head on his paws. Soaking in this atmosphere, I plan my next meander.

District Councillors' Update - May 2024

Community Asset - the District Council has received notification of the owner's intention to sell The Timber Batts Inn, Bodsham, which is designated as an Asset of Community Value. This has triggered a six-week period for community interest groups to express an interest in purchasing the land. This period started on 10 April 2024 and will run until 22 May 2024.



Crosskeys Coaches are planning to run a regular summer bus service from Folkestone West to Folkestone Harbour calling at Folkestone Central, Town Centre/Shellons Street, F51, Harbour Arm. The Operational Period proposed is 20 July –1 September 2024 Time: 10 am – 8pm. Other dates are being considered 14 June to 14 July (Euros) 1-14 July Wimbledon. Please watch this space.

Changing Places Toilets - The first of three new Changing Places toilets in the district has been officially opened at the Coastal Park. Similar facilities will soon follow at Radnor Park and Dymchurch. Changing Places toilets are designed to meet the needs of disabled children and adults with complex needs who rely on carer support. Specialist equipment inside includes ceiling hoists and changing tables. The District Council secured £205,000 for the project from the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities' Changing Places Fund under the previous Administration.

The EES (Electronic Entrance System) is due to be introduced on the 6th October this year. Eurotunnel is well advanced in its preparations and they anticipate only minimal delays. The problem is the Port of Dover who have no room to introduce the electronic checking system and will have to manage the process using hand held tablets. Delays are anticipated and if the traffic jam extends back to the Roundhill Tunnel, the M20 will close with the consequential gridlock in the district.

Hoarding Panels - Work has finally begun on removing the hoarding panels surrounding the Princes Parade site in Hythe. A 1.2m perimeter fence, necessary to restrict access to an area where there is known contamination, will be installed in its place during the works. Ecologists are on site to ensure badger setts and other wildlife habitats are safeguarded. A public consultation on what people want to happen to the site will take place later in the year.

Otterpool Park is making progress. Homes England is back on board and discussions continue. The team feel that the work with Homes England seems very likely to finally unlock the site. Property consultants Savills have been instructed to remodel the site in terms of finance, viability and phasing.

Rural Prosperity and Green Business grants - Recently, there have been several Rural Prosperity and Green Business grants awarded. Two of which have been given in this Ward; one in Stowting and one in Sellindge. The Green Business grant is now closed but there are still some funds available for the Rural Prosperity grant.

School Sustainability Project Day - A very successful School Sustainability Project Day was recently held at the Council Chambers. It is a trial initiative, initially with three primary schools involved: Elham Church of England Primary, Churchill Primary in Hawkinge and Sellindge Primary schools. All three schools presented their excellent plans for a sustainable garden at their school.


A LITTER PICK





A New Pilgrimage Route Has Been Developed Linking Churches in Canterbury, Lyminge, and Folkestone

This project aims to highlight the achievements of royal Kentish women who were crucial to the development of Christianity in England and who have long been side-lined in history.


The pilgrimage route, called the Royal Kentish Camino, is just over 23 miles (37.7km) long. It starts at St Martin's Church in Canterbury, part of the World Heritage Site that also contains Canterbury Cathedral and St Augustine's Abbey. This celebrates Queen Bertha whose private chapel was at St Martin's. Bertha was pivotal to her pagan husband King Æthelberht accepting Christianity and together they established the first Christian royal family in England.

The route proceeds from Canterbury to Patrixbourne where it turns south and heads down the Elham Valley towards Lyminge. Midway along the route is St Mary and St Ethelburga's Church, Lyminge, where recent excavations uncovered the remains of a church, scientifically dated to the time of Bertha's daughter Ethelburga (Queen of Northumbria). She founded a church here in the 630s, that was re-excavated and studied in detail in 2019. Ethelburga is celebrated for beginning around 625 with her husband King Edwin, the conversion of the North of England to Christianity. She later returned to Kent to live at Lyminge after Edwin was killed in battle. These stone foundations in Lyminge churchyard are evidence for what is likely to have been one of the first Christian communities in this country.

From Lyminge, the route climbs up onto the ridge of the North Downs and passes the ancient church at Paddlesworth, dedicated to St Oswald, one of the first English saints, before reaching the coast above Folkestone. From there you descend the cliff to the harbour and then climb the opposite cliff where Bertha's granddaughter and Ethelburga's niece Princess Eanswythe founded the first church in Folkestone around 660.

The end of the pilgrimage route is at St Mary and St Eanswythe's Church, Folkestone, the scene of exciting discoveries during the recent Finding Eanswythe project. The church is dedicated to Eanswythe, who is recorded as founding a very early Christian community at Folkestone. Human bones were discovered hidden in the church wall in the 19th century which were scientifically analysed in 2020. They are of a well-nourished young woman and date to the time of St Eanswythe, making them most probably her bones preserved as relics in the church she founded since the time of her death and hidden at the time of the Reformation under Henry VIII. Nowhere else in the British Isles is there a church preserving the relics of its founding saint, so St Eanswythe's shrine is in this sense unique. Her shrine provides a fitting end to this new pilgrimage route celebrating the foundational achievements of three generations of Royal Kentish Women who had once been largely forgotten.

The pilgrimage launches on Saturday, 27th April. By the time you read this, leaflets providing more information about the Royal Kentish Camino will be available at various locations around the parish. Production of the leaflets has been kindly grant-funded by our District Councillors Jenny Hollingsbee and Elaine Martin. about on the beach, someone in the NCI watch station will be looking out for your safety.

The UK has one of the finest search and rescue services in the world co-ordinated by the Maritime and Coastguard Agency (HM Coastguard). In 1994 the reorganisation of HMCG resulted in the closure of many of its coastal stations. Electronic surveillance was improving in leaps and bounds and the Coastguard can now perform many of its functions using sophisticated tracking and communication technology. What was lost, however, was the visual overview of much of the coast.

Tragically not long after the coastquard station at Bass Point in Cornwall was closed, two fishermen lost their lives in the waters below the station. Concerned local people decided to take on the station and staff it with volunteers. THE NATIONAL COASTWATCH INSTITUTION (NCI) was born.

Today there are nearly 60 NCI stations around the English and Welsh coast and more than 2,600 trained volunteers looking out for the safety of our coastline and inshore waters users. NCI has a dedicated VHF channel 65 (Call sign -Folkestone NCI) – which can be used by yachts, canoeists, fishing vessels and other water users for radio checks weather forecasts and tide times. This takes some of the routine VHF radio calls away from HM Coastquard.


The Folkestone station at Copt Point is based in the refurbished Royal Observation Corps premises and has fine views of the Channel from Dover to Dungeness. It overlooks the Warren and the harbour. Equipped with high resolution binoculars, VHF radios, radar and AIS (automatic identification system), CCTV and computers. Staffed by trained volunteers, the station is a recognised asset in the Coastguard's search and rescue family. We work closely with HM Coastguard, RNLI, Border Force and Police to ensure the safety of people in and on the water, and along the coast.





SPEED WATCH:

We are in desperate need of more speed watch volunteers. As you know, speeding through the villages is a big problem and our speed watch teams play an important role in documenting the speeding. 2024/2025 BUDGET:

The budget was prepared by looking back on previous years' budgets but more importantly, on actual spending patterns in these years. Several areas were considered - allowances were made for a clerk, responsible finance officer (RFO) and a handyman. Certain budget heads were combined, and the budget has been simplified. Routine, recurrent spends (office costs, subscriptions, insurance, etc.) are based on previous actuals, plus inflation as appropriate, and best estimates were made for planned projects.

The overall budgeted spend in 24/25 is less than current year 23/24. In 23/24, a budget for Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) receipts of £100k was included resulting in a precept of £107k being requested. In 24/25 although the budgeted spend is lower, a more realistic CIL budget of £10k has been included. This has resulted in a higher precept requirement of £152k.

Pick up a Plant

The hotly anticipated **Thoughtful Food Pick up a Plant** event is on **Saturday 11th May at 10am-1pm**. This is a chance to swap and share or just pick up plants. **THIS YEAR IT WILL BE OUTSIDE THE VILLAGE HALL** to coincide with the Craft Fair.

May is a very busy month in the veg garden as the days lengthen and it gets warmer (!)

Jobs for May

It's a good time to put up supports for your climbing crops and tomatoes.

Sow undercover – dwarf climbing beans, runner beans, sweetcorn, indoor cucumber, pumpkins, squash. You could also sow cabbage, kale, and purple sprouting broccoli ready to be transplanted next month Sow outside – lettuce, radish, spinach and beetroot, little and often to keep harvests coming.

Earth up potatoes when the foliage is about 20cm high, draw up earth from the sides to a height of around 15cms, almost covering the foliage.

Plant out young plants like celeriac, courgettes, squashes, pumpkins, marrows and leeks. Hold off for a bit if it's still cold Once planted protect with a cloche or fleece.

And don't forget to thin out crops and harvest!

Ready this month: lettuce, spring onions, broccoli, cabbage, spinach, rhubarb, beetroot, radish and peas.

Rhubarb

There's a lot more to rhubarb than just crumble. The stems can be used in sweet and savoury dishes, as well as drinks. Perhaps the very best thing about rhubarb is how incredibly easy it is to grow, and so can be a great way to provide a source of food with minimal space and effort. Most gardens will have space for a clump of rhubarb, although keep out of reach of pets as it is poisonous to animals.

As rhubarb is a perennial, it will come back each year, so no need to start seeds or plant out- it largely just does its thing until you eat it. Winning!

The sharp sweetness of the rhubarb is the perfect balance to earthy flavoured roots, and the cooking liquid makes a punchy dressing. The trick to keeping the shape of the rhubarb, and avoiding a stewed mush, is to cook it gently and then remove it from the heat just before it is tender, letting the declining heat of the pan finish it to perfection.

Ingredients

300g bunched beetroots	1 orange	small bunch of mint, finely chopped
300g bunched carrots	1 tbsp soft brown sugar	1 tsp caraway seeds, lightly toasted
salt & pepper	1 tbsp red wine vinegar	olive oil
175g rhubarb	50g watercress	salt & pepper



Method Prep time: 20 min Cooking time: 30 min

Step 1 Preheat your oven to 200°C/Gas 6. Remove the leafy tops from the beets and give them a good wash and scrub to remove any dirt. Do the same with the carrots.

Step 2 Place the beets in the saucepan, cover with cold water and season with salt. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for about 30 minutes, or until soft to the tip of a knife.

Step 3 Meanwhile, cut the carrots into evenly sized angular pieces. Place them on the roasting tray, coat with oil and season well with salt and pepper. Mix well and roast for about 20 minutes, or until tender and starting to colour.

Step 4 While the carrots and beets cook, cut the rhubarb into 3cm pieces. Split any wide pieces in half, lengthways, so that all the pieces are a roughly even size. Zest and juice the orange into a large saucepan, and add the sugar and rhubarb. Cover and bring to a simmer. Cook gently for 5-6 minutes, until the rhubarb is starting to soften but still holds its shape. Remove from the heat and leave it to cool with the lid on.

Step 5 When the beets are ready, remove them from the water and thumb the skins away. Cut into even-sized wedges.

Step 6 Let the carrots and beets cool a little while you make the dressing. Whisk 3 table-spoons of the rhubarb liquid with a pinch of salt, and slowly add 2 tablespoons of olive oil so that it comes together into a dressing. Tweak by adding a dash or two of the vinegar if you feel it needs more sharpness

Step 7 Mix the beets, carrots and watercress together with the dressing. Transfer to a serving plate and then gently place the rhubarb pieces across the top. Scatter over the mint and caraway seeds to finish.

Chalk Stream Monitoring And Awareness Afternoon: Saturday 11th May

Come and join local experts and volunteers for an afternoon of stream-dipping and monitoring of the Nailbourne on Tayne Field, on Saturday 11th May from 2pm, until about 3 or 3.30pm. Bring your wellies and help us evaluate the health

of the stream by identifying the wildlife living amongst the stones, watercress and other micro-habitats of the stream. We will also have experts on chalk stream management who can try to answer any questions you have about chalk streams in general and point you in the direction of available resources if you are responsible for managing chalk streams anywhere along the Elham Valley.

Chalk streams are one of the rarest habitats in the world, with only 260 true chalk streams known globally, most of which (85%) are in England. They are so special that some people refer to them as "England's rainforests" or "England's Great Barrier Reef". We are so lucky to have the Nailbourne running through our Parish, and we have a great responsibility to conserve and manage our chalk streams in a sensitive, informed and appropriate manner.

In October 2021 a new "chalk streams strategy" was published by the UK government with various partners, which can be easily found online. Recognising that chalk streams and their associated underground aquifers are important for people and biodiversity, the strategy is for everyone who has responsibility for, or uses, chalk streams. In June 2023 the first "Implementation Plan" related to the strategy was published, again easily available online. When the strategy was launched, the Chair of Natural England, Tony Juniper, explained "These habitats are subject to a complex range of pressures, from pollution arising from road runoff, agriculture and sewage, to low flow resulting from abstraction for public water supply and physical damage to the water courses", and expected the strategy to result in the "joined-up partnership action needed to address these pressures, protecting and restoring chalk streams for future generations to enjoy".

Bumblebee Workshop And Next Steps

Thanks to everyone who turned up to the bumblebee identification workshop in Lyminge at the end of March, and to the Bumblebee Conservation Trust for running it. Considering how cold and windy it was, it was particularly remarkable that the workshop participants managed to find any bumblebees at all, and even more remarkable that they managed to find a Ruderal bumblebee, the rare "target" species that we were hoping to find having found one the previous year. This does suggest that a population is established locally. We are working with the Bumblebee Conservation Trust to implement follow-up work and will report on that in due course. Lyminge Ponds Doing Well

February was one of the wettest and warmest on record in the south-east of England. The ponds at the bottom of Court Lodge Green succeeded in holding all the rainwater that accumulated in them and have done since the creation of the second pond. Nevertheless, by the end of February the water level was almost up to the level of the path beside the attenuation pond. We continue to keep a close eye on the water level and whether further flood mitigation efforts will be required in the future.

The team can help with:

- Maximising income: Completing benefit checks to ensure that you are receiving all you could be entitled to.
- Help with form filling: We know those forms are tough! Our team are here to support you. Whether with Blue Badge applications, Attendance Allowance or any other form you need support with, we are just a call away.
- Care and support advice: A change in health can be a challenge and often needs adapting to. Find out what support is out there and where to access it.

Letters To The Editor

The recent high water table has brought to life springs which haven't flowed for many years and water to flow in normally dry ditches.

I have always assumed that the ditch, which is now flowing, on the west side of Station Road as it enters Lyminge (bordering Glebelands) was a man made drainage ditch or possibly an old road alignment. Having looked at the geological map I now realise that it is neither of these things. That map shows a deposit of "Head" along the base of this ditch running towards Broadstreet Cottage. Head is material which has moved down slope and accumulates at the foot of slopes or low lying areas, and in these parts often along the base of dry valleys. Most of this accumulation occurred during and shortly after the last ice melt, about 11,000 -12,000 years ago. So this is an ancient water course, now sprung to life.

I wonder if this could be the missing West Brook complimenting East Brook?

LYMINGE THEN AND NOW

Our monthly look at how Lyminge has changed over the years, with thanks to Lyminge Historical Society.



Street. At the cross roads with Church Road was the smithy, opposite the pub. There were a few cottages along the north side of the High Street, but the south side was occupied largely by Church Meadow, owned by the Rector personally in his capacity as Lord of the Manor. When the Rector Canon Jenkins died in 1896, he passed this land to his son, who in 1901 sold it to a local property speculator, Algar Arthur Alfred Basham. He was an Essex boy who had married a local girl from Folkestone. In 1891, he was working as a carpenter. In 1899 he was a hairdresser in the Folkestone Harbour area. But in the early years of the 20th Century, he put up the row of properties that still stretches from Annbank to what is now Moonraker. The White House (to the left of the picture) and Stanley Lodge and York Lodge next to it, have all lost their original decorative first floor balconies. Stanley Lodge has also been extended to the side, but otherwise all the houses are still readily identifiable. The terrace at the end of the High Street was also built at this time by Folkestone butcher Ernest Elliott, and was then known as Elliott's Row. The street was radically transformed over the space of a few years. Since then, the greatest change in the street scene is undoubtedly the presence of parked cars in 2024. One may also ask whether the road in around 1910 was actually in better condition than it is now, though it was not tarmacked back then.


